CALLING ALL INTERNS

The second class of the Region VIII Leadership Academy is half way through the academic year and have set their sights on graduation at the National meeting in Atlanta in July. We are now looking for applicants for the next class which will begin on September 28, 2015 at Jackson.

The Region VIII Leadership Academy (R8LA) is open to all interested ASCLS members in the 5 Region VIII states – Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, and Utah. The R8LA begins just prior to the opening of IMSS with classes meeting on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday morning of that week. As with this year's class, a social activity will be planned for Tuesday afternoon. The opening days in Jackson are a time to get to know each other, attend leadership sessions, and to brainstorm a project that will help our states in Region VIII. After IMSS, the Academy turns to Saturday

morning video or audio conferences with faculty members presenting many excellent sessions. Topics covered during the Academy year include: history of ASCLS, communication and leadership styles, team building, parliamentary procedure, emotional intelligence, convention planning, advocacy, networking, mentoring and coaching, and recruiting. In the spring, the Interns are encouraged to share information about their project and the Academy at their state spring conference. They then do a final presentation of their project at graduation which takes place at the Region VIII Summer Council meeting one day prior to the beginning of the national meeting. This year, the meeting will be in Atlanta; the 2016 meeting will be in Philadelphia.

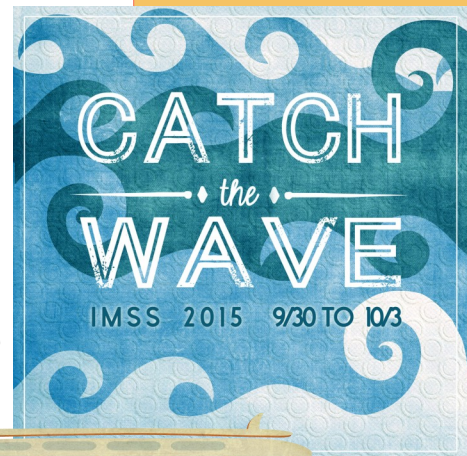

Did you know...

according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, over 40% of the MLS workforce is projected to retire in the next 10 years while the demand for Medical Laboratory Scientists is projected to increase 22%. The current median age of the workforce is 55 years old.

Did you know...

MLS educational programs do not qualify for STEM funding? MLS educational programs haven't been appropriated funding since 2006. Current training will only produce half the workforce that will be needed in the years to come.

The BOD has begun the process of recruiting a new EVP for ASCLS. Based on the recommendations of the Futures Task Force in 2012, a diverse Search Committee will be assembled, and these 8 – 10 members will hire and work with a search firm to identify and interview candidates, and select a new EVP.

Elissa Passiment has truly served ASCLS and the profession of clinical laboratory science with a passion and dedication that is unsurpassed. During this transition process, the ASCLS BOD wishes Elissa the very best in her coming retirement, and because we all know Elissa, we can be assured she will continue to find ways to give back to our profession and her community in service to others.



A STRONG AND ACTIVE PRESENCE

A couple of weeks ago, I received a scholarship from ASCLS and had the privilege of traveling to Alexandria, VA for the ASCLS National Legislative Symposium. The topic that I found to be most relevant to me was the workforce shortage and it dominated much of the discussion.

I would highly encourage other students and professionals to attend this symposium if they have not already had the opportunity. It is imperative that we have a strong presence and are active in our profession.

OUR NEXT STEPS TOWARD LICENSURE

At the March 7th meeting of the ASCLS-Idaho Board of Directors, the next steps for the ASCLS-Idaho licensure effort were discussed and a strategy developed for the coming 12 months. One of the most important pieces of this strategy will be developing a “To-Do List” for members. We will be asking for everyone’s help to accomplish this huge task, and it’s only with a team effort that such an endeavor can be successful. If each one of us takes responsibility for a small piece, the collective result can be immense.

You will be seeing, over the next few months, requests to contact your state legislators and let them know that we believe that anyone performing clinical laboratory tests should have the appropriate education, training and certification. We will provide template letters for those that would like them, and can assist in determining the names of your legislators, as necessary.

Recently, an [article written by faculty members at Texas State University](#), another state looking to license laboratory professionals, received a lot of interest and generated a lot of discussion, and emphasizes that, in all but 12 states, almost anyone can perform your medical laboratory tests.

Although many larger hospitals in Idaho require certification to be employed in their laboratories, many smaller facilities do not use that standard. One of the “To-Do’s” for the Board of Directors will be to try to determine how many non-certified personnel are performing laboratory tests. Another task will be to determine an approximate cost to become licensed in Idaho, and what the cost and frequency would be for renewal.

We will continue our series of licensure articles in this newsletter, helping our members to become educated about the importance of licensure and to learn how to answer questions from those who have questions about licensure. We also have licensure information posted on the ASCLS-Idaho website, located at www.asclsidaho.org.

We will also be searching for physicians and hospital administrators to support our efforts and help us convince the Idaho Medical Association and the Idaho Hospital Association that licensed laboratory professionals bring better quality healthcare to their patients, and, in many cases, save hospitals money by improving laboratory test utilization.

Licensure of medical laboratory professionals is essential to assure accurate and timely laboratory test results, which are the key to most of the decisions made in the practice of medicine. Stay tuned for how you can help in this effort for our profession.
