


"Oh, so you're a nurse!". "You work in the Lab? Then you must be a phlebotomist". "Well you work at the hospital, so you know first aid." "You have some sort of medical degree, so you could perform a heart transplant!" Ok, maybe not.

To the general public, most laboratory professionals are unnoticed and unknown. The phlebotomist is the 'Face of the Lab' and is often the only contact the patient has with the laboratory. Once the tubes are drawn, labelled and placed into the transport system that patient transforms into a specimen.



The goal Medical Laboratory Professionals Week is to bring recognition to all laboratory practitioners, to unify members of the profession and to offer education and transparency to the patient.

So, what can your lab do for MLPW (besides teaching first aid and organ transplants)?



- **LabWeekRun:** Virtual 5K run. Organize a fun and creative run with your coworkers. Take pictures—post on FB and submit to labweekrun.com. Registration is open now!
- Play dress up: Wear your Superhero costume under your Lab coat.


