Restaurants and bars lined the river which provided a relaxing city vibe.

The ride was surprisingly smooth and lasted 10 minutes. Many bright lights lit up the wheel at nighttime allowing it to be seen from far away.

I spent the third evening on the 96th floor of the John Hancock tower. Instead of visiting the observation deck on the 94th floor and paying full price, I decided to take in the city view from the lounge on the 96th floor while I enjoyed a piña colada. The lounge faced west, which provided an excellent view of the sunset. Taking pictures in the lounge was a bit of challenge because of the tables bordering the windows. Another fun activity was the Chicago Art Institute. The

Now the part you've been waiting for: the food of Chicago. *Giordano's* is one of the famous pizza restaurants with locations all over Chicago. After not being successful on my pizza quest the first two nights due to insane wait times, I was determined to get pizza for lunch on the third day so I pre-ordered it online and fulfilled my quest. I have two words to describe *Giordano's* deep dish pizza: life changing. The pizza was made up of 2 crusts with a solid inch of cheese sandwiched in between with a homemade red sauce on top.

If you're into amazing desserts, then take a trip to *Hugo's Frog Bar and Fish House*. They're famous for oversized desserts. The dessert menu changes every day based on what the chefs make. We looked at the menu and decided on a slice chocolate mousse pie. Heads turned as the waitress brought the enormous slice of pie to our table. The pie was complete with a steak knife sticking straight up with hot fudge, and chocolate shavings. Holding up the chocolate mousse was a one inch thick Oreo crust. Someone sitting at the table next to us asked where the rest of our family was to partake



in the dessert consumption. He chuckled when we told him it was just the two of us. We ate half and took the rest back to the hotel to share with our roommates.

Another unique dessert restaurant was the *Nutella Café*. With many dessert options on display, it was hard to pick just one. I settled on the panna cotta because it was something that I'd never had before. Panna cotta is a simple Italian dessert made of sweetened cream and gelatin, typically served with berries. In this dish, the panna cotta was served underneath a mound of berries with Nutella drizzled on top.

As you can tell, fun memories made up my first Annual Meeting experience and it's something I'll never
